Transformer presents *Interspatial*, a group show curated by Quota. Founded by Dawne Langford and Avi Gupta, Quota is a curatorial collaboration dedicated to broadening cultural diversity in public discourse around artistic creation and representation. In this group exhibition, artists **Rachel Schmidt**, **Johab Silva**, and **Levester Williams** explore the concept of spaces, both real and imagined with responses to changing or unfamiliar landscapes and restrictive environments.

Interspatial presents multiple interpretations of space by examining elements that define and create transformation. Spatial placement can be used to enforce power structures, resulting in a seemingly intractable system, making change and



responsibility difficult. "Space' can also be a moment of expansion, leading to clarity and innovation," says Langford. From self-identity to our balance with nature, boundaries of confinement permeate our ability to traverse any given arena. Do we try to fit in or redefine what these spaces are?

Artist Bios:

Rachel Schmidt loves stories – those based in reality and those based in the "realities" found in myths, legends, or fairytales. In her current body of work, Schmidt explores the impacts that the growing urbanism of the planet could have on distant futures. Schmidt has a Masters of Fine Arts from MICA and has exhibited in various venues, local and international, including Hillyer Art Space, Artisphere, (e)merge Art Fair, DCAC, Arlington Arts Center and an upcoming solo show at Flashpoint Gallery.

Johab Silva, a native Brazilian, has been working in Washington, D.C. since 2008. Sense of place and inheritance; appropriation and protest, are themes that motivate him. He works to convey the unexpected story through the interpretations of found objects and the endless possibilities of abstraction. Silva's work has been shown at The Corcoran Gallery of Art, Miami Art Palace and the Santo Andre Museum of Art. He is currently pursuing a Master's Degree in Art Education at the Corcoran College of Art and Design.

Levester Williams dislocates objects from original contexts by rendering them within new contextual forms. He imbues an appreciation of the objects' essence and historical richness and inspires a dialogue between the objects within our corporeality and "so-called" socially constructed identities. Williams is currently pursuing his MFA in Sculpture + Extended Media at Virginia Commonwealth University. His work has shown at Connersmith, Artisphere, and the Art Workhouse in Lorton, VA, Ohio, and Michigan.

About Quota:

Quota's mission converges on changing the structure of traditionally marginalized artists being relegated to presenting work that emphasizes "otherness" in relation to an unquestioned norm – a relationship defined by and in the interest of maintaining the dominant culture. (www.quota-art.com).

As an artist, his work has been exhibited across the U.S., including solo shows at The Corcoran Gallery of Art, The Orlando Museum of Art, Civilian Art Projects and overseas at the Nottingham Castle Museum and Sainsbury Centre for Visual Art in the UK. Alongside private collections, his work is held in the permanent collection of the Library of Congress in Washington.
