Bread and Butter Curatorial Talk and Event with Artist and Exhibition Guest Curator Carolina Mayorga: Saturday, May 12, 2012; 5 – 7 pm



Is food about class or identity? Are we as individuals totally responsible for our eating habits? Do our individual preferences influence others? According to author Michael Pollan, our experience with a most basic physical instinct has been distorted: the simple act of satisfying one's appetite has been replaced by anxiety, confusion, and a set of rules that are no longer the product of nature. For those privileged enough, eating has become an act of snobbism; a world of foaming, melting and evaporating substances of different textures, shapes and colors. For the rest, eating is still related to hunger with the majority of the world's population eating cheap products, dying from starvation, or fighting obesity.

Bread and Butter Guest Curator Carolina Mayorga finds herself constantly revisiting the topic of food: "My ongoing interest in the theme has been influenced by personal experience and by writers who examine food culturally, geographically; as a product and as a commodity. For this exhibition, I chose a group of young artists that look at the issue from different perspectives: food choices and lifestyles, the advertisement of food products, human relationships around the dining table, and a look at the production of the bites we place in our mouths." Chanan Delivuk, Sara Pomerance, Kari Scott, and Shannon Young present their interpretations on the subject, challenge norms, question radical views, bring their experiences and perspectives to the table, and present the audience with their course of choice:

Chanan Delivuk is interested in the ways that food, agriculture and biotechnology relate. Delivuk relies on investigation for most all her projects, and considers research essential to her practice. Delivuk received her Master of Fine Arts in New Media from The George Washington University. She lives and works in Washington, DC as the Assistant to the Director of Civilian Art Projects and as a Teaching Artist for several local non-profit organizations.

Sara Pomerance believes that repetitive actions found in everyday interpersonal relationships, and individuals' psyches and associated behavior, are potent with larger questions about perception, impulse, learned behavior and society. Both her history as a working artist and life experience motivate a burning desire to shed light on a subject in need of investigation and exposure. Sara received her BFA in Fine Art Photography from the Corcoran College of Art + Design in Washington DC, and her MFA in Photography from the University of New Mexico.

Kari Scott earned her BFA degree in Craft and Material Studies at Virginia Commonwealth University in Richmond and an MFA in Fibers and Material Studies at Philadelphia's Tyler School of Art. She is currently an adjunct professor in the Fibers Department at Tyler School of Art in Philadelphia.

Shannon Young is a multi-media artist that lives and works in Portland, Oregon. She received an MFA in painting from American University and will be graduating from Imaging Media and Digital Arts program at UMBC this year. Shannon has exhibited at Maryland Art Place in Baltimore, The Warehouse in Washington, DC and 1708 Gallery in Richmond, VA.
