TRANSFORMER & VISUAL AIDS PRESENT ReMIXED MESSAGES FEATURING TEXT-BASED ART EXPLORING HIV/AIDS

Transformer and NY based Visual AIDS proudly present *ReMixed Messages*, an exhibition of over thirty text-based works reflecting reactions to and connections through HIV/AIDS across generations, curated by John Chaich and hosted by Fathom Gallery.

Diverse in media and multi-generational in scope, ReMixed Messages pairs work by internationally acclaimed artists—including Robert Blanchon, John Giorno, Felix Gonzalez-Torres, Yoko Ono, Jack Pierson, Kay Rosen, David Wojnarowicz and Rob Wynne—with a new generation of respected artists working with text, including DC-based artists Linda Hesh, Maggie Michael, and Tim Tate.

Exhibition includes works by: Robert Blanchon, Paul Chisholm, Cammi Climaco, Amanda Curreri, Craig Damrauer, Joe De Hoyos, Chloe Dzublio, John Giorno, Felix Gonzalez-Torres, Nolan Hendrickson, Linda Hesh, Lisa Iglesias, James Jaxxa, Frank H. Jump, Jayson Keeling, Larry Krone, Sam McKinniss, Maggie Michael, Ivan Monforte, J. Morrison, Nightsweats & T-cells, Yoko Ono, Jack Pierson, Hunter Reynolds, Kay Rosen, Tim Tate, Charlie Welch, David Wojnarowicz, and Rob Wynne.

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Artist Jack Pierson says, "By being included in ReMixed Messages, I hope my work can provoke new thought about how we care and what we fear about HIV today." Pierson's Desire/Despair, a photograph of a found-letter sculpture recalls the emotional intersection where our feelings about HIV often reside.

First presented at La MaMa La Galleria, New York City in 2011, this DC exhibition co-produced by Transformer and Visual AIDS and presented at Fathom Gallery is remixed for the International AIDS Conference 2012 this July: an occasion that sharpens the bite of featured artist J. Morrison's aids: made in the usa silkscreened American flags. "As the oldest organization in the country dedicated to raising AIDS awareness through art and supporting artists living with HIV, Visual AIDS hopes ReMixed Messages will reengage discussions about how HIV has reframed personal and political worldviews," says Amy Sadao, Executive Director of Visual AIDS.

The dichotomy of personal and political, mediated and interpreted, is reflected through the scale and mediums throughout the show. Referencing the slow jam of the same name, Always and Forever by Lisa Iglesias is a hand-cut chain link necklace made of found cardboard that hangs over 8 feet wide and tall, while Yoko Ono's 4x6 inch Plexiglass piece simply and powerfully states "Touch Me." A photostat by Felix Gonzalez-Torres, framed under highly reflective glass, rearranges the chronology of events in the gay rights movement and forces viewers to see themselves in this collective history.

Just two years after his censorship at the National Gallery in DC, an oversized reprint of David Wojnarowicz's seminal 1990 *Untitled (One Day This Kid...)* amplifies the dislocation and fury that lives in the work both then and now. The eight feet wide canvas will be displayed in Fathom's street-level windows. "Transformer helped lead the art community's response to the Wojnarowicz censorship, and we are proud to help boldly display his work in DC through *ReMixed Messages*," notes Victoria Reis, Transformer's Co-Founder, Executive and Artistic Director.

Along with Wojnarowicz, ReMixed Messages features several Visual AIDS artist members including Robert Blanchon, Paul Chisholm, Joe De Hoyos, Chloe Dzubilo, Felix Gonzalez-Torres, Frank H. Jump, Hunter Reynolds, and acclaimed DC-area artist **Tim Tate**. Tate's video piece, On the Threshold of Liberty, and layered glass reliquary, Two Paths Taken, both recall the personal and political aspects of living with HIV and rely on their mediums to sensitively and provocatively inform the message. Tate recalls: "Two Paths Taken epitomizes the moment of the realization of sero-conversion. Your life suddenly splinters into what you believed your life would be, to what now it will become. Both paths have their pros and cons. Nothing is black and white."

ABOUT THE CURATOR: Beginning his career as an HIV testing counselor and community educator, **John Chaich** has designed a range of multi-arts projects to raise AIDS awareness. He has presented at national conferences on AIDS and the arts and has written on visual responses to HIV/AIDS for Art & Understanding magazine as well as contributed the catalogue essay for Fleshing Out the Grid: David Wojnarowicz and Hunter Reynolds for P•P•O•W Gallery. www.johnchaich.com
